## Tools

- Digital camera, or,
- Cell phone camera
- Computer
- Editing Software: iMovie or other available application.
- Pencil & Paper

## 3 Stages of making a Video Movie

Pre-production - Brainstorming ideas and storyboard

Production - Using the camera to video

Post-production - Editing video & audio in an application.

## SPECIAL PLACE

A special place can be any place that is special to you. It can be in your home or out of your home.

## Steps for Pre-Production

- 1 - **Decide** what special place you will tour.
- 2 - **Get** pencil & paper.
- 3 - **Observe** - Go to that special place and observe it. Look and walk around.
- 4 - **Write** a list of the things you like about it that makes it special to you.

## Objectives

SWBAT use a camera and digital technology to video and narrate a tour.

SWBAT write a script for their tour dialogue.

SWBAT ask for assistance from available supports (parents, siblings, etc.) in the production of their video tour.





# Create a Video Tour of a Special Place

## Storyboards, Camera Angles and Narrative Scripts

**Storyboards** are a series of drawn picture sketches that outline a story. It is the story planned out in sequences of the action from start to finish. It tells the story in scenes and camera angles, and can be as simple as stick figures, or complex with more details. Each rectangle is called a "panel".

**Step 5** - Get pencil and paper and create a storyboard of your tour. Next to each panel you may write camera angles you will use, and dialogue (narrative), or use a separate piece of paper for narrative. **More in Step 6.**




Establishing shot of classroom.

in alarm over assignment.




Student feels overwhelmed.

Camera pans slowly to make space.





1. Wide shot of both Sarah and Callum illustrating where they are and what the film is about  
Props: Megaphone, Camera board



2. Close up of Sarah speaking directly to camera

Script: Sarah  
One thing you must remember...



3. Low angle camera painting up at Callum  
Props: Moustache, Paintbrush  
Script: Callum  
'Oops! Sarah is right...'



4. Close up of Sarah holding photograph




5. Camera zooms out to a wide shot showing Sarah speaking about using photographs to plan your storyboard.



6. Over shoulder shot of Callum pointing to drawings of different shots that you could try filming.




## Storyboard Examples



User arrives at station, sees kiosk and long queue for the ticket office




User goes through selection




On payment screen, he chooses mobile phone

## Create a Video Tour of a Special Place

### Camera Angles

When a story is told in a movie or video, the camera angles make the story interesting and exciting.

For example, a close up creates intimacy and makes the viewer feel more than they would feel if the camera view was farther away.

Study the camera angles a choose at least 4 different angles for your tour.

### Step 5 continued -

Decide which camera angles you may want to use and draw them into your storyboard panels, or note them in the space under your storyboard panels.

Step 6 - Write your narrative.

**Narrative Script**

Now you need to write out your script. What will you be saying to your audience during the tour? You may write this under your storyboard panels as you draw them, or, on a separate piece of paper. I recommend a separate piece of paper because some camera angle details may need to be written under the storyboard panels.

You may create your own Narrative Template very easily. Here is an easy, effective template style you may copy. You may need more space between lines for your writing than I have created here.

**Keep in mind the following.**

- 1 - For some of the narrative you will be talking directly into the camera as it is aimed at you. You will either be holding the camera yourself, or someone else will be holding the camera and aiming it at you. ### Production Steps

#### Step 7 - Start videoing

At this point you have learned a lot and have the best information for your production. You are now in the production stage.

PRACTICE a run through of each scene before recording. Try one now and play it back for review. If it is good you can keep it. Yay!

Keep repeating this until you finish.

#### Keep in mind the following.

1 - For some of the narrative **you will be talking directly into the camera** as it is aimed at you. You will either be holding the camera yourself, or someone else will be holding the camera and aiming it at you.

Think about which camera shot is best for these times, such as close-up, medium shot, etc. You may have already decided this while drawing out your storyboard.

2 - For some of the narrative **you will not be talking directly into the camera.** Instead you will be aiming the camera at something else and talking off camera. You will be off camera speaking your script, telling the audience about something the camera is aimed at.

As above, think about which camera shot is best for these times, such as close-up, medium shot, etc.

### Post-Production

#### Step 8 - Edit Video & Audio

Now is the time to use a video editing application. If you are using your computer and iMovie or another editing application, you will need to transfer your camera files to your computer. After you do that you will open the chosen application and begin editing.

You might have a mobile app to edit with. Use that if you prefer.

**Editing** - If you do not have an editing app, search the internet to find something. Check these lists, too.
